

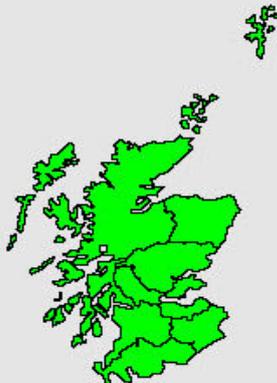

Pitsligo Castle

In the North-East of Scotland, bounded by the rivers Don and Deveron, lies an area known since ancient times as Buchan.

It is an area of good rich farm land and coastal villages that were fishing villages in the days when the North Sea still contained fish!

Near one such village, Rosehearty, on Buchan's north coast, stands the ruins of Pitsligo Castle.

Until the mid-16th century, Pitsligo Castle stood as a simple oblong keep, and in this fairly poor corner of Aberdeenshire, it would be reasonable to expect that it might have remained as such, but that was not to be the case.

A period of considerable building activity occurred in the late 1500s, which may or may not be related to a curious historical event that happened nearby.

In 1556, Ivan the Terrible, 'Czar of all the Russias', sent an Ambassador and a shipload of treasure to "Bloody" Mary Tudor (elder daughter of Henry VIII, and half-sister of the future Elizabeth I), the ruling Queen of England, with whom he wished to form an alliance.

Some have claimed it was the richest treasure ever loaded onto one ship!

Unfortunately, as the *Edward Bonaventure* sailed down the North Sea with the Russian Ambassador and all the goodies onboard, a huge storm blew up and when the ship tried to find shelter in the Moray Firth, it was driven ashore near Quarry Head – just two miles west of Pitsligo Castle.

By the time the authorities reached the wreck, the treasure was nowhere to be found!

There followed a flurry of diplomatic activity between the courts of England, Scotland and Russia (whose Ambassador had survived the wreck and seen much of his treasure being salvaged).



Mary Queen of Scots was still a child and Scotland was ruled by a Regent – her mother, Mary de Guise – who ordered a judicial enquiry into the disappearance, conducted in the Hall of Pitsligo Castle's old keep, where the two main suspects, Forbes of Pitsligo and Fraser of Philorth were interviewed.

The lairds pleaded complete ignorance, and after a lot of shoulder shrugging, "Fit likes", "Wreck – what wreck?" and "Dinna kens", that was pretty much the end of the business!

Except that the properties of Pitsligo and Philorth both thrived from that time on – in fact, the two families even went on to build their own towns nearby.

The Frasers built the town and port of Fraserburgh (which even had a university for a while) and the Forbses built Rosehearty.

In 1577 a substantial new 'palace block' was added onto Pitsligo's old 15th century keep, to be followed by various other extensions and improvements over the years that followed.

It would seem likely that much of this work was funded inadvertently by Ivan the Terribly Wealthy's imperial treasure!

The Bunbury MacAussies . . . a new Scottish group

A Scottish group with strong links to the Society has been founded in Bunbury.

The members include Scots, Australians with Scottish heritage or who have married Scots, and others who just enjoy Scottish culture, music and food.

"We have a great time reminiscing about growing up in Scotland, sharing stories and enjoying a few drinks," Ellen said.

"One comment I have heard a lot from young and old is how great it is to hear the Scottish accent, which broadens as the night goes on, of course.

"I've passed on The Saltire to members of the group and there has been talk of going to the St Andrew's Day Ball in November.

"So look out for a few Bunbury MacAussies on the night!"
